PSYCHOLOGY OPTIOPN: Why is General Psychology the most popular undergraduate course? The study of psychology provides an understanding about WHY we think, feel and behave the way we do. In addition, psychology is comprised of research and theoretical foundations that intersect with all disciplines in the liberal arts. The Psychology Option introduces students to psychology as an academic discipline, science, and profession. Course work stimulates critical thinking about the human experience from multiple lenses including gender, culture, race, and ethnicity across the lifespan.

- Understand basic psychological concepts, facts, research methods and theories.
- Gain insights and understanding of adaptive and maladaptive behavior from the biological, behavioral, cognitive, psychodynamic, humanistic and sociocultural perspectives.

CAREER LANDSCAPE

The Psychology Option prepares students for careers in allied and public health, business, criminal justice, education, human and mental health services, social work and the arts.

It leads to advanced studies for careers as psychologists in the clinical, neuropsychology, forensic, social, developmental, school, sports and/or organizational psychology fields or as licensed counselors in the substance abuse, marriage and family, school and career fields.

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PSYCHOLOGY – RESEARCH OPTION

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If we knew what it was we were doing, it would not be called research, would it?"

PSYCHOLOGY — **RESEARCH OPTION:** Psychology is the study of behavior and mental processes and entails the application and practice of the scientific method. The ability to make exciting new discoveries through scientific inquiry require research skills and this option creates a path for those who wish to critically examine the world and empower themselves as advocates for reasoned change. The Psychology — Research Option places an emphasis on the abilities to reason and problem solve as a scientist. The required courses in this Option are an introduction to the concepts and theories critical to the understanding of human behavior, the scientific method, the math and writing used in the discipline as well as the research skills required for scientific investigation.

TOP ACADEMIC SKILLS

- Develop information literacy, writing skills, and the ability to communicate research findings in a discipline-appropriate manner.
- Develop an understanding of the scientific method and the research skills required for scientific inquiry.
- Develop reasoning, logic, problem solving and critical thinking skills.
- Gain insights and understanding into human behavior.

CAREER LANDSCAPE

The Psychology-Research Option prepares students to pursue entry-level career paths in research, data analysis, and the Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) fields, and is a gateway to study Psychology or any of the STEM disciplines at a 4-year college.



LIBERAL ARTS OPTION PSYCHOLOGY— RESEARCH OPTION

The Psychology—Research Option requires 9 credits, in addition to the completion of the Required Common Core class, ENG 110. PSY 101, MAT 120, and ENG 110 can be taken in any order (or concurrently), but PSY 101 must be taken before PSY 150.

BEHAVIORAL SCIENCES disciplines study different social aspects of human behavior and the ways in which humans have developed and interact in the context of their own social reality. The Behavioral Sciences Interdisciplinary Option includes studies in Sociology, Anthropology, and Psychology. Sociology examines social behavior, social interactions, social institutions, and social change. Anthropology adds to the knowledge about past societies and cultures as well as the origins of humans. Psychology concentrates on individual behavior and personality and the social aspects of human behavior. When these three disciplines are studied together, we develop a deeper understanding of our everyday reality, our culture, human behavior, and of the wide variations of norms and values of different societies.

TOP ACADEMIC SKILLS

- Develop information literacy, writing skills, critical thinking, analysis, application, evaluation skills and the ability to synthesize content in meaningful ways.
- Connect and understand the conceptual relationships among the different disciplines of Behavioral Sciences like Sociology, Anthropology, and Psychology and synthesize these concepts into a comprehensive, multidisciplinary approach.
- Become familiar with teamwork and communication skills necessary for future studies.

CAREER LANDSCAPE

This Option provides a strong background for entry level positions as caseworkers, case managers, counselors, group workers, child advocates, family managers in social services, community organizations, non-profits, health services, and other agencies.



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SOCIAL SCIENCES OPTION: HISTORICAL STUDIES

WELCOME TO THE LIBERAL ARTS OPTIONS!

THE HISTORICAL STUDIES OPTION introduces students to the disciplinary frameworks, research methodology, and historical knowledge necessary to analyze social groups, societies, and issues as an historian. Students will explore and analyze various societies and the experiences of ordinary people, with particular attention to the effects of class, race, ethnicity, and gender norms. In addition to learning about different geographical areas of the world, students will also encounter essential and significant questions that humans have explored for millennia, while learning about competing schools of historical thought and practice.

TOP ACADEMIC SKILLS

- Develop information literacy, oral and written communication skills, and the ability to synthesize content in meaningful ways.
- Develop reasoning skills and the ability to ask critical questions, improve reading comprehension, write in multiple disciplines, and problem solve.
- Acquire a multi-dimensional perspective on historical processes across time and space.

CAREER LANDSCAPE

This Option provides students with the skills for majors including History, Political Science, Pre-Law, Education, and Ethnic Studies and careers in Education, Politics, International Affairs, Consulting, Editing, Public History, Museum Curation, and other fields that value strong reasoning and writing skills.





SOCIAL SCIENCES OPTION: HISTORICAL STUDIES

The Historical Studies Option requires students to successfully complete 4 courses. Students must complete 2 of the 6 historical sequences listed below. At least one of the sequences must be from Tier 1: the Required Sequences. Students will be permitted to either complete both of their sequences from Tier 1 or they can take one sequence from Tier 1 and one sequence from Tier 2.

SOCIAL WORK OPTION: The field of social work is one of the most versatile fields within the Liberal Arts. The Social Work Option prepares students to understand the theoretical and applied practice of social work. It objectively examines the effects of services and inequalities in relation to gender, social economic class, and racial and ethnic. Students will acquire applied concepts and skills in interpersonal interactions to solve dysfunctional events in clienteles' lives. The Option offers practical skills used in solving social problems through an interdisciplinary team.

TOP ACADEMIC SKILLS

- Develop information literacy, writing skills, and the ability to synthesize content in meaningful ways.
- Develop and understand theoretical and practical skills in addressing and solving client's dysfunctionality through actual interactions with professional social workers.
- Provide objective understanding of social and mental health problems through the understanding of human behavior and motivations.

The Social Work Option provides students with entry level skills in case plans and expertise at the four year or master's level. It is a gateway to employment in Human Services and facilitates transfer to Bachelor and master's programs.

It prepares students with interdisciplinary and experiential learning to develop lifelong professional strategies to work, serve, support, and educate older adults. Graduates build a professional portfolio that prepares them for job opportunities in settings such as hospitals, nursing and rehabilitation centers, senior centers, adult day care programs, assisted living facilities, respite care, and home health care agencies.







WOMEN'S AND GENDER STUDIES OPTION: Drawing on feminist scholarship, the WGS Option explores the pervasive role that gender, and its intersections with other social categories of identity, has played in human societies. In WGS classes, students examine gender and sexuality in the family, media, popular culture, literature and the arts, history, employment, psychology, religions, science, and politics, with emphasis on the experiences and contributions of women and the LGBT community. Because education does not stop when students leave the classroom, WGS students make connections between their lives and their studies, deepening learning and encouraging civic engagement. By examining attitudes and practices that foster gender justice, WGS students are poised to effect change where they work and in their communities.

TOP ACADEMIC SKILLS

- Develop information literacy, oral and written communication skills, and critical thinking by questioning assumptions about gender and other categories of social difference.
- Analyze causes and solutions to transnational conditions of inequality faced by women and girls





THE BLACK STUDIES OPTION introduces students to Black Studies, a discipline focused on African centeredness and an Afrocentric frame of reference in research methodology, pedagogy, and intellectual production. Students study the intellectual heritage of people of African descent throughout Africa and African Diaspora communities from an Afrocentric and interdisciplinary lens. This Option cultivates junior scholars dedicated to civic engagement and applying emancipatory knowledge. Students will engage in interdisciplinary inquiry that spans cultural and historical studies, arts and humanities and social and behavioral sciences, among other disciplines, with a wide array of courses and student-centered extracurricular programming hosted by student clubs such as the Black Student Union, the Hip-hop Club and the Capoeira Club.

THE LATINA/O/X, LATIN AMERICAN, AND CARIBBEAN STUDIES OPTION introduces and engages students in the histories and cultures of the people of the Caribbean, Latin America, and their diasporas in the United States throughout the centuries. Through interdisciplinary and experiential studies, students participate in curriculum-integrated, Bronx-based, city-based, and campus-based cultural, educational, and social events focusing on the U.S. Latina/o experience, the Afro Latina/o and Afro-Caribbean, and Latin American experience, Puerto Rican and Dominican Studies, and Border and Immigration Studies. Literature, art, and cultural expressions are explored through activities organized by the Latin American Writers Institute of Hostos and the Hostos Center for the Arts and Culture. Bilingual faculty support students with developing English language skills.

TOP ACADEMIC SKILLS

- Develop information literacy, oral and written communication skills, and the ability to synthesize content across disciplines such as History, Literature and Cultural Studies, Anthropology, Sociology and Political Science.
- Identify and discuss key historical and cultural issues in Latina/o, Latin American, and Caribbean Studies.
- Develop an understanding of the diversity of Latina/o, Latin American, and Caribbean heritages, histories, cultures, and identities.

CAREER LANDSCAPE

This Option prepares students to pursue jobs as teachers, professors, lawyers, paralegals, social workers, managers of cultural institutions, and other positions which advance the plight and understanding of Latina/o and Latin American peoples. Students develop a knowledge base transferrable to four-year colleges.

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

It helps students develop skills in analysis, composition and ear training. Students learn about music history and music in world cultures. They develop listening skills by recognizing different ensembles and groups of instruments including the human voice.

Students engage with known faculty musicologists and performers. They may participate in the College's dynamic programming of the Hostos Center for the Arts & Culture featuring musicians from diverse backgrounds and styles. Field trips to concerts at Carnegie Hall and/or Lincoln Center provide students the opportunity to learn first-hand what it means to work in the 21st century world music industry.

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

THE THEATER OPTION introduces students to the skills and knowledge necessary to begin a career working and performing in theatre. Recognizing that theatre is a combination of different arts, from writing and designing to performing and directing, this Option provides a well-grounded introduction to the components that make theater such an exciting and creative art form. Experiential learning opportunities provided by a partnership with the Hostos Center for the Arts & Culture, allow students to observe and work with top theater and entertainment professionals in the creation of new work. Field trips to Broadway and Off-Broadway plays are part of course offerings. In the past, students have performed at the International Collegiate Theater Festival in Edinburgh's Fringe and the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival, Region 1.

LINGUISTICS OPTION: LANGUAGE, SOCIETY & CULTURE

THE LINGUISTICS OPTION, LANGUAGE, SOCIETY AND CULTURE, introduces students to the multi-disciplinary field of linguistics. Linguists study all aspects of language (sounds, word forms, meanings, sentences, and grammar) and how these are used for successful communication and academic development. This study of language and communication draws upon knowledge from psychology, education, sociology, political science, anthropology, history, computer science, artificial intelligence, and media studies. The Option examines introductory linguistics concepts; bilingualism; language acquisition; the interplay of language, society and culture; and the role of language and identity across disciplines. It explores the relationship of language to social and historical events and develops an appreciation for the multi-cultural and international variations in speech and communication.

TOP ACADEMIC SKILLS

- Develop information literacy, oral and written communication skills, and the ability to synthesize content in meaningful ways.
- Recognizing how specific details of communication affect personal and social interactions.
- Relate academic content to their own use of language.

CAREER LANDSCAPE

This Option prepares students for majors in education, ESL, speech pathology, and library/information science and careers in health, business, law, criminal justice, social work, computer science, government, advertising, and the media. It aids employment in the health professions, para-professions, and the military for students with an A.A. degree.
