








Headcount Enrollment at Hostos Community College

Strategic Plan – Finishing Strong

- Data shows we must improve student completion – e.g., 17% 3-yr grad rate
- This includes redefining "completion" parameters
- Next 12 months focus on 3 areas to accelerate completion on credit and non-credit sides

- Rethink Remedial and Developmental Education (G1, I2)

Updates from the Office of Academic Affairs

English Developmental Courses

Research supports that fewer developmental levels = increased academic progress

New English Developmental Courses (Spring 2015)							
Course	Population	Pass Rate					
ENG 93 (6 hours, 0 credits)	Students who need to pass the reading and writing exams	27% passed both R and W 45% passed either R or W					
ENG 101 (6 hours, 3 credits)	Students who need to pass the writing exam	73% passed the class and writing exam and received ENG 110 credit					
ENG 102 (6 hours, 3 credits)	Students who need to pass the reading exam	71% passed the class and reading exam and received ENG 110 credit					

The new developmental English courses allow students the opportunity to progress academically in less time, using less financial aid.

Small Group Instruction (SGI)

SGI supports students who persist yet do not pass the reading and writing exams.

In spring 2015, of the 53 students tested, 34% passed an exam. In fall 2015, 80 students are participating in SGI.

Eligibility:

- 3 or more attempts at CATW and/or reading exams via courses and workshops
- Unable to repeat ENG/ESL course

*Students with accumulated credits receive priority


