Following its acclaimed three-day retrospective of Tito Puente in April 2017, the Hostos Center for the Arts & Culture presents "Machito & the Impact of the Afro-Cubans at 80," a three-day celebration of the

career and 80-year influence of the iconic singer / bandleader (1908-1984) on a variety of musical styles, including salsa and, especially, the development of Latin jazz, affecting the music of Dizzy Gillespie, Charlie Parker, Stan Kenton and others. The weekend also delves into the careers and impact of Francisco "Machito" Grillo's musical partners (and family members) in his group the Afro-Cubans – including the composer / arranger / musical director Mario Bauzá (1911-1993) and the heralded singer Graciela (1915-2010).
